## Addressing Cost and Time Issues in Sport Arbitration

An overview of the importance of timely proceedings and cost-control in sports-related disputes. The presentation will draw on the experience of national/regional anti-doping organizations, and of international federation tribunals, in conducting doping-related hearings and suggest that the sport dispute system needs to be more efficient without compromising fairness. It will suggest practices that enhance timeliness and manage costs.

Prospects for extending mediation usage into underserviced areas like disciplinary and doping issues will be explored.
